The India@75 initiative actually began in New York

In 2007, CII and the Ministry of Tourism, GoI organized the Incredible India Week in New York. At one of the events, the Late Professor CK Prahalad delivered a keynote address titled - India@75. It was about what India needed to do in order to become a world leader by 2022. CII identified very strongly with what the Professor said and in 2008, under his guidance, launched the India@75 initiative.

India@75's agenda has been designed by the people of India

In 2008, CII met with the people of India to understand their aspirations for the India of 2022. In one of the largest public visioning exercises of its kind, CII organized 123 workshops and 964 interviews covering 6000 people across 21 States. The data gathered from these interaction was scientifically processed to come up with a national vision document called *The People's Agenda*. 21 states also came up with their own agenda. The India@75 is housed in India@75 Foundation

In 2012, CII set up the India@75 Foundation to ensure the smooth and effective implementation of the initiative. It has its own Board of Trustees, who guide and mentor the initiative. Dr Naushad Forbes is the Chairman of India@75 Foundation. Read about the other trustees here.

Let's begin at the beginning.

First, what exactly is India@75?

India@75 is a CII initiative that brings different stakeholder groups together so that they can to help India reach the milestones documented in the People's Agenda. There are seven milestones listed in the document. Let's look at three of them and save the rest for the subsequent editions!



How does India@75 bring together people?

It creates platforms and programmes that allow different groups to come together for a common goal. Let's simplify with some examples:

<u>Functional Literacy Programme (FLiP)</u>: This programme is for NGOs, Industry and even individuals who want to helphe informal sector understand how to use the internet to become economically empowered.

The National Volunteering Grid (NVG): This is an example of a platform. NVG is an online volunteering portal that connects NGOs and Corporates who need volunteers for their projects to individuals who want to volunteer their time and skills.

Is it only the India@75 team that designs all these platforms and programmes?

No. While the examples shared have been designed by India@75 team, CII divisions, its Centres of Excellence (CoEs) and even its members have all been working to create strong platforms and programmes. More on that next time!

<u>The National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC)</u> is the flagship skilling organization in the country. Did you know that CII that helped the government set it up in 2008 as a part of its India@75 initiative. Do find out how this organization is helping India.

Model Career Centres (MCCs): These physical centres counsel, skill and prep up job seekers before conecting them to the right job. They are a part of the National Career Service launched by the Ministry of Labor & Employment to help youth make career choices based on their aptitude. CII is helping the government set

up Model Career Centres, across the country. This is a good example of the Industry and the government coming together to build a skilled workforce in India.
