The employability quotient of India: CII-Wheebox release India Skills Report 2021



CII released the 2021 edition of its flagship research initiative — **India Skills Report**. This is held as the marquee report for the sector and serves as a comprehensive analysis of the ground realities. It is prepared by Wheebox, in partnership with Taggd, CII, AICTE, AIU and UNDP. Some key takeaways from this year's report titled '*Post-COVID landscape of Talent Demand and Supply in India*' are as follows:

- In 2021, as many as 45.9 percent of graduates are employable as compared to 46.21 percent in 2020 and 47.38 percent in 2019.
- MCA graduates are the least employable at 22.42 percent followed by polytechnic students at 25.02 percent.
- BTech graduates are the most employable at 46.82 percent followed by MBAs at 46.59 percent.
- Despite women being more hireable, men secure more jobs. On an average, 64 per cent of all professionals are men, while women make up only 36 percent of the workforce.

- At 46 percent, the BFSI sector has the highest percentage of women in any sector. The IT Industry employs 39 percent.
- The automotive sector employs the highest number of male employees at 79 percent, followed by the logistics sector (75 percent). The core and energy sectors follow with 72 percent.
- Candidates from Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, and Karnataka are the most employable.
- Hyderabad, Bengaluru and Pune top the list in terms of employable talent.
- The hiring intent has almost doubled after a steep decline in 2020. The intent was at 15 percent in 2019, down to 10 per cent in 2020 and currently stands at 19 percent.
- In 2021, BFSI, software/hardware, and IT and internet businesses are expected to be the lead hirers.

Project Manthan: Corporates lend a hand to strengthen grassroots NGOs



NGOs are usually the last leg of the service delivery chain in India. What makes the contribution of these grassroots organizations remarkable is that what they lack in skills they make up in passion. If we filled these skill gaps, they could significantly increase the impact of their work at the ground level.

Professionals and organizations can play a big role here by volunteering time to build the capacity of these grassroots organizations. However, there needs to be a system through which they can connect to the NGOs that need help and vice verse.

The India@75 facilitated Project Manthan serves as this bridge. In Oct'20, India@75 partnered with Sukalyan, a nonprofit based in Kolkata, to start the help build capacities of 200 grassroots NGOs in West Bengal, Bihar, Jharkhand, Assam, Odisha and Meghalaya. Given the realities of the pandemic, most of the capacity building sessions have been digital. The Project has enabled 14 webinars under seven themes and helped 20 NGOs, thus far.

Corporates have been more than willing to be a part of Project Manthan. Cognizant, Nayara Energy, Financial Management Service Foundation (FMSF) and CPA Services Pvt. Ltd have sent their people to hold training sessions for the NGOs. Many more organizations have expressed interest.

Tomorrow in the making: CII Jharkhand and IBM organize a roundtable on Manufacturing in the Future



The roundtable deliberated on what the factories of the future would be like in terms of structure, technologies and processes. The discussion focussed on two stages of manufacturing excellence—automated and intelligent. New technologies are bringing paradigm change in industrial production and leading to a phase we now call Intelligent Manufacturing.

While automation simplifies processes, AI speeds up innovation and makes these processes more intelligent. It is important for businesses not to depend on just one or two technologies, but leverage

combinations spanning automation, AI, edge computing, cloud, 5G, and digital twins to transform their operations. Deploying this vast array of technologies is complex and requires both IT and OT skills to architect and execute.

CII organized an interaction between a group of CEOs and the Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, on the Union Budget 2021–22.
